Book Title: Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood

Author: Trevor Noah

Book Synopsis: A coming of age story of an intelligent, mischievous young boy; surviving pitfalls of dating in high school; misadventures as an enterprising young man with his buddies from the hood; his experiences growing up with an unconventional mother and a stepfather who was cruel when he drank. Trevor Noah's raw account of his path from apartheid South Africa to the desk of The Daily Show began with a criminal act: his birth. Trevor was born to a white Swiss father and a black Xhosa mother at a time when such a union was punishable by five years in prison. Living proof of his parents' indiscretion.
